

Eventually, you'll be able to put together puzzles with several hundreds or even thousands of pieces, but it takes time to get to that point. You have to understand how the pieces fit together and how to match the colors, details, and shapes of your pieces to the puzzle you are working to complete. A bigger puzzle will take you more time to work on; in fact, it could take you several days or weeks to complete a bigger puzzle.


