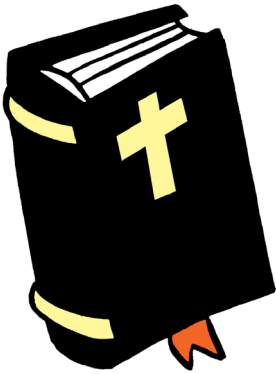


Saul Escapes in a Basket
